## Macalester – Groveland neighborhood (District 14, Saint Paul)

### Population

- 19,772 people lived in this neighborhood in 2000.
- Total population decreased 3% in the 1990s, compared to 5.5% growth in Saint Paul as a whole.  
- U.S. Census, 2000

### Age profile, 1990-2000

- The number of preschoolers (age 0-4) decreased 22% to 1,132 children.
- The number of school-age children (age 5-17) increased 4% to 2,855.
- The number of working-age adults (age 18-64) remained about the same at 13,924.
- The number of older adults (age 65+) decreased 23% to 1,861.

### Race and ethnicity, 1990-2000

- The White population decreased from 96% to 92%.
- The Asian population grew from 2% to 3%.
- The Black population grew from 1% to 2%.
- The Latino population grew from 1% to 2%.
- The American Indian population remained at 1%.
- 2% of residents were multiracial.

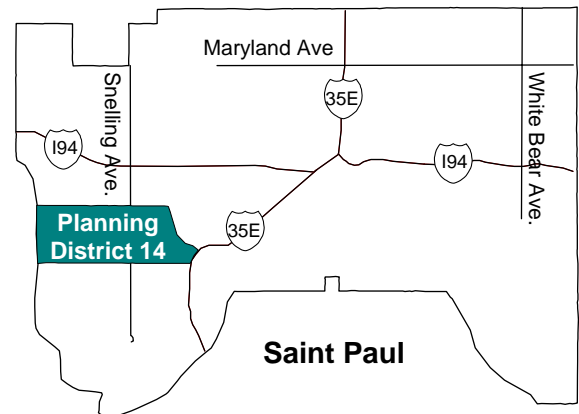

### Languages

- 7% spoke a language other than English at home. Spanish (3%) and other Indo-European languages (3%) were the most common.
- 2% of residents did not speak English “very well.”

### Countries of origin

- 5% of neighborhood residents were born outside of the United States.
- 3% of neighborhood residents came to the U.S. in the 1990s.
- Of those born outside the U.S., 40% were born in Asia, 24% in Europe, 17% in Latin America, and 10% in Africa.

### Households

- An average of 2.22 persons per household in 2000, down from 2.33 in 1990.
- 26% of households had children, down slightly from 28% in 1990.
- 82% of children lived in married-couple families, 15% in single-parent families, and 3% in other arrangements (primarily with grandparents and other relatives).

## Children and youth

- 15% of public school students in this neighborhood were children of color.
- For every 20 public school students living in this neighborhood: 17 were White, 2 were Asian, 1 was Black, 1 was Hispanic, and fewer than 1 in 20 were American Indian.
- English was not the primary language spoken at home for 6% of public school students.
- 10% qualified for free or reduced-price school lunch, compared to 65% in Saint Paul as a whole.

- In 70% of families with children under age 6, all parents in the family were in the workforce.
- 5% of children and youth age 5 to 20 had a disability.

## Older adults (age 65+)

- The Census counted 1,861 older adults in this neighborhood in 2000.
- 38% were living alone, about the same as in 1990.
- 97% were White, 1% were Latino, and 1% were multiracial.
- 28% had a disability.
- 2% had income below the federal poverty level.
- 80 grandparents lived in the same household with their grandchildren, and 10 of them were responsible for their grandchildren.

- In 2002, 87% of older adult households were homeowners and 14% were renters.
- 19% (about 240 households) had no registered vehicle.
- 39% of older adult households had estimated annual income below \$30,000.

## Housing in 2000

- The U.S. Census counted 8,395 occupied housing units in 2000.
- 72% were owner-occupied (5,925) and 28% were rented (2,300 units).
- 75% were built before 1940, 13% between 1940 and 1959, and 12% since 1960.
- 88% of homes were heated with gas and 8% with electricity.
- Fewer than 1% of households had no phone service.
- 54% of the residents in this neighborhood had lived in the same home for at least five years.

## Housing costs

- 16% of homeowners and 34% of renters were paying 30% or more of their income for housing in 1999 (this includes households of all incomes).
- The median rent in this neighborhood was \$653 in 1999, compared to \$565 in the city as a whole.
- 79% of homeowners had a mortgage in 1999, and paid a median of \$1,175 for monthly housing costs.
- The 22% of homeowners with no mortgage paid a median of \$363 in monthly housing costs.

## Cars and drivers

- 7% of households had no vehicle, 43% had one vehicle, 40% had two, and 10% had three or more.
- 70% of workers in this neighborhood drove alone to work, 10% walked, 7% carpooled, 7% took public transportation (including taxis), and 4% worked at home.
- The average one-way commute took 18.2 minutes for workers living in this neighborhood (compared to 21.1 for Saint Paul as a whole).

## Workers and jobs

- 78% of residents age 16 and over were in the workforce in 2000.
- Top occupations included management/professional (57%), sales and office work (24%), and service jobs (11%).
- Top industries employing residents in this neighborhood included education/health/social service (33%) and professional/scientific/management (15%).
- 79% of workers were privately employed, 15% were government workers, and 6% were self-employed.
- 8% of people age 21 to 64 had a disability, and 68% of them were employed (compared to 88% of those in the same age group with no disability).

## Education

Of those age 25 and older:

- 98% had at least a high school education.
- 22% had some college or a 2-year college degree.
- 64% had a 4-year college degree or higher.
- 27% had a graduate or professional degree.

## Income

- \$56,155 was the median household income in 1999 (compared to \$38,774 for Saint Paul as a whole).
- Men in this neighborhood working full-time, year-round earned a median income of \$47,421 compared to \$37,438 for women.
- 34% of households had income of \$75,000 or more.
- 17% had income of less than \$25,000.
- 1% of households received public assistance in 1999, an average of \$2,734 for the year.
- 19% received Social Security income, an average of \$12,385 for the year.

## Poverty

Families with income below the poverty level in this neighborhood included:

- 3% of families with children
- 4% of families with children under age 5
- 12% of single mothers with children
- 4% of single mothers with children under age 5

Individuals with income below the poverty level included:

- 5% of all residents in this neighborhood (compared to 16% in the city as a whole)
- 3% of all children under age 18
- 2% of older adults age 65 or older

## Notes on race/ethnicity

Beginning with Census 2000, people can now choose more than one race category. The numbers presented here include only those people who checked a single box on the race question. Those who checked more than one race category are listed separately as multiracial.

Also, the numbers presented here do not include Latino people in any race category, but only in a separate Latino category. So, for example, people who said they were Latino and also said they were White are counted here only in the Latino category.
